


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
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### More about water for Lake Elsinore

Perhaps you would like to know what's going on in Sacramento in connection with that perpetual struggle to obtain water for Lake Elsinore.

Our Assemblyman Gordon Cologne finally got his Resolution approved by all parties and was able to present it to the Assembly May 15 where it was unanimously passed.

If you are interested in "whereases" here's the Resolution in its entirety:

WHEREAS, The Legislature of the State of California has authorized the loan of \$750.000 from the Small Craft Harbor Revolving Fund to the Division of Beaches and Parks for the purpose of filling Lake Elsinore with water; and

WHEREAS, the respective state agencies interested in this project have substantially approved all the legal and engineering formalities necessary for the delivery of water and the development of Lake Elsinore; and

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Water District has offered to sell surplus water when it is available for the filling and replenishing of Lake Elsinore; and

WHEREAS, The feasibility of the entire project depends on the availability of surplus water, which cannot be guaranteed by any agency; and

WHEREAS, construction of certain works for the transfer of water must be built at a cost of approximately \$250,000 prior to the actual physical

availability of water; and
WHEREAS, The Lake Elsinore Park
and Recreation District has adopted a
resolution stating that it believes surplus water will be available from some
source and desires to proceed with the
project assuming the responsibility of
repayment of the loan to the extend of
a 25-cent tax rate whether or not such
water is available; and

WHEREAS, The County of Riverside has adopted a resolution stating it believes surplus water will be available and will execute a contract agreeing to guarantee the repayment of the loan for the amount in excess of the 25-cent tax rate of the Lake Elsinore Park and Recreation District; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE ASSEMBLY of the State of California, the Senate thereof concurring, That the members of the Legislature of the State of California do reaffirm its position favoring the filling of Lake Elsinore as previously authorized, and directs the Administrator of the Resources Agency and all appropriate state agencies to use such diligence and take such steps as may be necessary to complete the project of filling Lake Elsinore at the earliest possible date; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Governor of the State of California, the Administrator of the Resources Agency, the Board of Directors of the Metropolitan Water District, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Riverside, and the Board of Directors of the Lake Elsinore Park and Recreation District.

There you have it. Senator Lee Backstrand will present a Senate version of the Resolution to the Senate and if passed it will be sent to Small Crafts and Harbors for approval, then on to the Department of Finance which in turn will give the money to the Division of Beaches and Parks which will make the money available to complete the channel and valve facility needed to bring the water from the MWD line to Lake Elsinore. Senator Backstrand is confident the Resolution will pass the Senate.

### Lakeland Village has growing pains

When is a village not a village, is a question that is being discussed pro and con among the inhabitants of Lakeland Village and they are getting a lot of advice from their sister

city across the lake.

The thing all started the latter part of April when the Lakeland Property Owners held an organizational meeting at Richardson's Guest Haven which was followed by another meeting early in May at the Grand Avenue Civic Association Center at which time a president and board of directors was elected.

Jeral Stanley, a resident of Villa Park, who has considerable property at the head of Lake Elsinore, was made president and at a later meeting at the same place, outlined his views on the advantages of incorporating the district.

It seems Stanley is interested in some 30 acres of land adjacent to the lake on Riverside Drive and another 140 acres between Riverside and Machado

and was somewhat disturbed by the activity of Elsinore's City Planning Commission in annexing a number of pieces of property adjoining the city on the east and plans to annex the present dry lake bed. This, he feared, might be the first step in the city's plan to annex Lakeland Village.

Boomer Lee, prominent Realtor of Lakeland Village has acted as master of ceremonies at each of the Property Owners' meet-

ings.

The plan of incorporating Lakeland Village as a city in its own right is still conversation piece. It hasn't as yet got down to the facts of life. The cost of operating a city somewhat larger than Elsinore is still problematical and it is not likely that any further action will be taken until the Property Owners board of directors has received an answer to a questionnaire the board has sent out to numerous cities of similar size in the state seeking information

on the cost and maintenance of an incorporated city.

It has both its advantages and disadvantages and one must be weighed against the other before a decision can be reached.

Services come high these days. The Administration office of Riverside County has estimated that police protection supplied by the county would cost in the neighborhood of \$50,000 a year for one car, one man, 24 hours, daily service. Street maintenance would run around \$800 per year per mile for county standards and there are 39 miles in the proposed Lakeland City area.

Then there is the all important matter of sewerage and sewerage disposal, and that is not a matter of maintenance alone but calls for the establishment


of a system.

And when the money is made available to care for all these things the question still remains where to find capable and experienced persons to conduct the affairs of a city.

Some of the advantages of living in an incorporated city will be pointed out in an article appearing in the July issue of this magazine.

### Babies in silk hats playing with dynamite

When former Congressman John Rousselot spoke to an audience of 600 in Elsinore on April 24 he made charges that since have caused an explosion in Washington political circles. Among charges made by Rousselot were:

That the Soviet Union's Nikita Khrushchev, speaking before the United States Congress in 1959, proposed a three-stage program for world disarmament to culminate with the pooling of national armies under United Nations control:

That in 1961 the Council on Foreign Relations came up with a similar threepoint recommendation;

That later in the same year and shortly after a meeting in Vienna between President Kennedy and Khrushchev, the State Department issued a booklet entitled "Freedom from War" which described a United States program for disarmament to be carried out in three stages;

That still later that year President Kennedy, in a speech before the United Nations, proposed a three-stage program for world disarmament under United Nations control and proposed that the program be started immediately;

That United States Ambassador to the United Nations Adlai Stevenson made the statement that the United States is in dead earnest in its efforts to disarm under the auspices of an International Disarmament Organization within the framework of the United Nations:

That the UN Military Staff has almost always been headed by a communist;

That over the head of the UN Military Staff is the Under-Secretary for Political and Security Council Affairs, a post which has always been headed by a communist pursuant to an agreement between Alger Hiss and the Soviet Union;

And that U. Thant. Secretary-General of the UN, by his own admission, has for years been a devout Marxist.

Rousselot said that the various three-point programs suggested by Khrushchev, the Council on Foreign Relations, and the State Department were for the most part similar. One of the suggested programs, which he clarified, called for two thirty per cent reductions in armament followed by surrender of the remaining arms to the United Nations.

Rousselot said that some of this disarmament has already begun and that he had been informed that the State Department is planning total transfer of United States military forces to the UN within three years—six years if it takes that long to convince the people of the United States. He said the State Department will neither confirm nor deny this statement.

The former Congressman, now a district governor for the John Birch Society, was sponsored in Elsinore by Elsinore Valley Incorporated.

The purpose of this editorial is to inform those who did not have an opportunity of attending the meeting, of what is going on in our government. If you are not in accord with this policy you have the privilege of writing your Congressman and Senator and expressing your views.

### What's going on down Kalmia Way?

For verily I say unto you, That whosoever shall say unto this mountain, Be thou removed, and be thou cast into the sea; and shall not doubt in his heart, but shall believe that those things which he saith shall come to pass; he shall have whatsoever he saith.—St. Mark 11:23.

We don't know what Dudley Schrimpton of the Mardley Co., Los Angeles, said to the mountain, but we do know that he instructed a half dozen operators of a like number of those giant bulldozers, (or whatever they call those things that cut freeways through mountains) to get busy and level a few miniature mountains appearing on some 48 acres of land on West Kalmia Street, Murrieta, recently purchased by him for his company, and believe it or not, those mountains have disappeared.

If you haven't been down that way the last couple of months you'd never know the place and if the late Frank Angus, former owner of the property, were to return today, he'd never recognize his old home.

As a matter of fact, this writer, who used to live on West Kalmia, now finds himself living on West Hayes Avenue, according to the street sign at the corner of Hayes and Kalmia, but we trust this is only a temporary improvement and that the sign will be reversed again in the near future.

But back to the 48 acres. Gone is the old barn of many colors which stood as a landmark for lo those many years until it became all tattered and torn and no longer housed the cow with the crumpled horn.

And what's it all about? Well, Dudley Schrimpton is going to convert this piece of property into one of the finest horse and cattle ranches to be seen in these parts.

His first move after purchasing the property was to contact Charles Gerhart, head of the Elsinore-Murrieta-Anza Soil Conservation District, with

headquarters in Murrieta, and Charlie had his engineer, Paul Nashida, draft a horse and cattle ranch that will be the envy of every horse and cow in the district.

He started on the west end with the construction of a large lake and from that point east of Hayes Avenue the property is given a five per cent drop. A 55-foot hill near the center of the property was reduced to ground level and some 100,000 yards of dirt moved to make a five per cent grade level for a smooth functioning sprinkler irrigation system for permanent pasture.


The entire area will be fenced and cross-fenced and under present plans two-thirds will be for registered white-faced cattle and one-third for horses.

The old Angus house is being remodeled and will serve as the home of Charles Setzer, ranch foreman, and his wife. Plans call for the building of a more pretentious home at a later date on a knoll being prepared for the site.

The purchaser of the property, the Mardley Company Inc., of which Schrimpton is vice-president, and his wife, Marjorie, president, is a subsidiary of the Schrimpton Manufacturing and Supply Co. of Los Angeles, a family corporation of which his son, Stuart Schrimpton, is president. The company deals in caterpillar tractors and marine engines.



Some years ago a group of civic minded women got together and decided it would be a nice thing to gather a sample of all the wildflowers in sight, and







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#### Eastern Star history lauded



to the late Zelma Scott Rigdon, a Past Matron in 1955, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Scott.





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
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## JUNE ISSUE NOW IN ORBIT!
