



Clearing of channel under way

Work on the San Jacinto river bottom is progressing slowly due to the rain that the area has received this past month. In spite of the mud and muck, which has caused some of the heavy earthmoving equipment being used by the California Asphalt Company to bog down, the men are diligently working to clear the way for water scheduled to pour into the dry lake bed at Elsinore early in February.

The work being done by California Asphalt includes clearing away heavy timber, brush and undergrowth, and in general to improve the existing channel so that water will flow unhampered from near Lakeview to Railroad Canyon Lake before it goes into Lake Elsinore.

Water is not actually scheduled to flow through the improved river channel until February 1, the river will serve as a carrier between that time and the end of March. Now with water assured for the lake the State Dept. of Parks and Recreation is seeking bids from persons and corporations interested in providing marina or boat

launching facilities and attendant services in the Lake Elsinore State Recreation Area, which includes Lake Elsinore.

The facilities and services are to be developed by private capital and on private lands, which are contiguous to state lands within the recreation area.

Other facilities required are adequate parking for boats and trailers when related to boat launching or other activities, adequate sanitary facilities and drinking water, snack bar or refreshment stand, floating dock or facilities for fueling and the loading and unloading of boats, a marina, boat sales, repair and storage, overnight accommodations, service stations for automobiles and marine supplies.

The Department of Parks and Recreation has announced that it is seeking qualified and competent persons or corporations to develop and operate the facilities contemplated.

Directors for the coming year will be C. H. Lee, Willie Joy, Stormy Keats, C. H. McLaughlin and Jess Watkins.

Installations of officers will be held on January 15.

Merger of California Electric Power and Edison Closer

Proposed merger of California Electric Power Company with Southern California Edison Company moved a step nearer on Thursday, November 21, when Edison stockholders voted overwhelmingly in favor of the plan.

At a special meeting of stockholders held in Los Angeles, Edison board Chairman Harold Quinton reported that the holders of more than 80 percent of the shares of each outstanding class of stock voted in favor of the merger.

Calectric's board of directors has called a special meeting of CEP stockholders to consider the merger proposal for 10 a.m. Monday, December 16, at Denver, Colorado.

If Calectric shareholders approve the merger by the necessary two-thirds majority, and other steps are completed as anticipated, Quinton said he excepts that the merger will become effective on December 31.

Plans for the SCE-CEP merger proposal were announced by the two companies on April 12. Public hearings on various aspects of the proposal were held during the spring and summer, and authorizations were issued by the California Public Utilities Commission on August 6, the Nevada Public Service Commission on August 29 and the Federal Power Commission on October 1.

Fred Oldendorf, Calectric president and board member, will become a vice president and member of the Edison board of directors. Also joining the Edison board and becoming a

member of its executive committee following the merger will be Gerald H. Phipps, CEP vice president, treasurer and director.

Gold Rush Roost

The Night Owls have added a new "roost" to its organization. It is the Gold Rush Roost of Perris Valley and president of the newly formed group is Mrs. Lydia Befford. Serving with her will be Clarence Muse as vice-president, Royce Bell, treasurer and Mrs. Ena Muse, secretary.

The Night Owls program is a listener participation program broadcast over KFI in Los Angeles.

Jay Guler to remain City Administrator

At the regular meeting of the Elsinore City Council the contract between Jay Guler, City Administrator and the city was renewed for three more years.

At that same meeting the resignation of Roger Mayhall from the Planning Commission was accepted.

Singleton Club at Sun City plans Christmas party

The Singleton Club, comprised of single residents of Sun City, have planned their Christmas party for December 9.

A gift exchange among the members will take place and there will also be a Christmas program.

Reservations should be made before December 12.

New Planning Commissioner for Perris

Ray Smith, son of Councilman Elmer Smith, has been named to the Perris Planning Commission by the Perris City Council.

He is replacing Willard Mushrush who moved from the area.

High School sites studied at Elsinore

Elsinore will have a new high school, but where it will be located is anybody's guess at present.

At a recent meeting held by the board of trustees the High School Study Committee preasented its findings on possible sites for a new high school to the trustees, but on action was taken. One group presented the Wildomar site which is already owned by the school district and another group suggested the Railroad Avenue site, east of the San Jacinto River.

The site on Railroad Avenue would have to be purchased and from the general discussion that took place at the meeting, the cost could be around \$300,000.

Many in the audience were in favor of the Railroad Avenue site because it is located within the city limits of Elsinore where city advantages of police protection, fire protection, sewer system and zoning could be had.

The date for the election of school bonds to build the high school has been set for January 21.





"God Bless America" says Maud Burrows of Perris

Eight months ago, on March 10, the town of Elsinore had an increase in population . . . the William Burrows family of Ireland, and then of England, moved in.

Maud, her husband William, their fifteen year-old

daughter, Robina and their six-year-old son, Alan came to Elsinore where they visited at the home of their daughter, Mrs. Thomas Norvell.

In July they discovered the town of Perris, found a home at 128 Perou Street and became residents. Now Maud and her family aren't any different than the average American, except they love America so dearly that one does not ever, in the presence of Maud, say a thing against this country of ours.

It seems that William spent 19 years in the Royal Air Force from which he was given a medical discharge. They had lived during that time in what is called "married quarters" but after the discharge he was given 61 days in which to move his family out of the quarters and find a home. In Ireland, where homes were available there weren't any jobs, so the family went to England. Work was available, but to find a house was another problem. They applied for a house with the colonial government, and were informed that their name was around 18,700 on the applicant list and they could expect a house in about 15 years. In the meantime. Maud and children could live in the women's quar-



A TOUR WITH DENNIS

Note: In the September 1963 issue of La Laguna Revue, we began a tour with Dennis Guler of Elsinore on his trip hrough the British Isles. Due to a lateness in the arrival of the pictures we were unable to complete the story, but both Dennis and photos arrived nome safely and we will now complete his story, both in photo and story form.

Since my last writing I have visited the places that I promised I would visit: Copenhagen, Elsinore, Oslo, Stockholm, Berlin, Paris.

I've slept in doorways, boat stations, hostels and student houses. I've hitch hiked and traveled by bus, boat and train, and have gone without sleep and food for stretches as long as 30 hours. I've been places, seen sights, done what there was to do and perhaps most important of all, I met people.

Unlike the U. S., Europe is a place where one may easily meet persons, not only from the country one is visiting, but from all over the world. The small-

ness and compactness of Europe as compared to the U. S., the richness of culture, both past and present. the lack of extreme expense and the existence of extensive overnight housing, specifically for travelers, combined with relaxed camping laws, colonial ties and, with the exception of France and perhaps Sweden, the relative ease with which a hitch hiking traveler can get a lift, all make Europe a haven for travelers from all parts of the globe.

Riding in the back of a truck between Copenhagen and Berlin I met two boys from Algeria. In a Norwegian hostel, two German girls, and in the common room of the Berlin hostel I was in lengthy conversation with a Jew, a Negro-Arab and a girl from the Union of South Africa. While hitch-hiking I met a Danish school teacher, a German truck driver, an English businessman, a soldier in the NATO forces among others. I shared the roadeventually a lift and in the end several hours spent with a Dutch boy in southern Denmark. I lent a book to a Rhodesian girl and talked of women and politics with a fellow traveler from Israel. The list goes on and on.

By far I met the greatest number of people while hitch-hiking which proved to be probably the most rewarding way I could have traveled. I found it also to be the most unsure as far as time schedule, personal safety and night accommodations are concerned, but well worth the discomfort if one is young, wishes to be excited and perhaps even is a little low on cash.

We, Howie Raab of Brooklyn, and myself traveled first by bus with an overnight stint from Edinburgh to London. The next day we boarded the boattrain for Copenhagen which after 23 hours of travel had taken us across the English Channel, through to Rotterdam, northern Germany and Zealand, Denmark.

From Copenhagen we took a train up to Elsinore and then to test the savour of the road hitch-hiked back.

For \$30 we bought a train pass to Scandinavia, which we used for overnight trips

only, thus saving us the cost of a hostel.

We went first up the eastern coast of Norway through Oslo, over to Stockholm, Sweden then down through Malmoi to Copenhagen. From here on, except for a short section through northern France, we traveled by thumb and slept where chance led us. Our two major stops were Berlin and Paris.


Two German boys picked us up on the road to Berlin in the rain. They shared with us food, a guitar and their company. Even though they were anxious to get home they took us to the U.S. military installation in Berlin and found us a place to spend the night. Despite the fact it took them only minutes to pass the border check into East Germany they waited the

hour it took us to get through and in many ways eased our crossing. They went out of their way for us and at the time the only way we could repay them was to thank them. Their mention here represents my only further means of repayment.

Berlin proved to be the most emotionally interesting part of the trip. By that I mean one is fasci-




nated, more than that one's feelings are aroused when confronted with the great symbols—the Brandenburg Gate, the Wall, and numerous accounts and pictures of escapes and near escapes. Then to cross the Wall, view Brandenburg from the other side, to cross so easily and are dying to cross, this is what I mean by an emotional interest.

To cross into East Berlin is a simple proceeding one need only present their passport, wait for their



I encountered no restrictions against cameras and between Howie and myself there were three. Pictures were allowed any place but at the wall.







He brings with him his wife, Lorraine and their two daughters, Deanne, a sophomore and Rhonda who is a sixth grade student, both at the Elsinore schools.




