

VOTE ON APRIL 14 ...

The cities of Elsinore and Perris will hold elections for city officials on Tuesday, April 14.

In both towns, eight persons seek three city council seats.

Perris voters will choose between eight candidates to fill three city council seats for the next four years. Candidates are Mayor Robert Warren Jr., incumbent; Elmer Smith, incumbent; H. L. Brosesamle, Warren G. Bergren, T. C. Richards, Robert D. Perry, Leonard M. Kirkpatrick Jr., and Glen Casner.

Filing for the position of city treasurer is James Laurensen and Marvin Funk.

Candidates for city clerk are Florence German and Pauline Rusher.

Elsinore voters have solved part of their voting problem, for Florene: Marshall, city clerk, and Clay Scott, city treasurer, both filed and were unopposed.

The eight residents filing for the three city council seats in Elsinore are Tom Yarborough, incumbent; Edward Berry, incumbent; John Merrifield, Muriel James, Rupert Lucas, Frank de Pasquale, Louis Goulart and Dolores Mayhall.

Photos and a short resume on each candidate appear throughout this issue. We ask that all voters, study the qualifications of each candidate carefully and then go to the polls and vote.

Remember the future of your cities is in their hands for the next four years, so think it over—then vote.

Also on the Elsinore ballot is a measure to have the city clerk appointed by the council instead of being elected by the voters.

JOIN IN THE FUN

On opening of Lake Elsinore

The Division of Beaches and Parks will officially open the refilled Lake Elsinore April 4.

In gala, day-long festivities, the community of Elsinore will celebrate the occasion.

There will be the ribbon cutting ceremony at 10 a.m.

Then will come a parade, boat races, a boat parade depicting the history of the lake, a water sports show featuring skiing events, and a street dance.

In addition, civic, service and social organizations are pitching in with booths to provide food and fun for the thousands expected to attend.

The three-mile long lake, now over 12 feet deep where two months ago there wasn't a bit of mud, will be open to boaters immediately after the water show. From then on, the lake will be for public use only.

The focal point is the Lake Elsinore State Recreation Area, a unit of the State Park System, where most of the day's festivities will occur. They will take place in this order:


Booths will open shortly after 8 a.m. to accommodate the early comers. The Highway Patrol advises that an early start be made to avoid traffic congestion during the late morning and afternoon.

The ceremony will begin at 10 a.m. Hugo Fisher, administrator of The Resources Agency which made money available to purchase the water, will be the principal speaker.

Prior to the 15 minutes allocated to speeches, a pa-

rade will take place. Five high school bands, the cadets and marching band of the Elsinore Naval and Military School, the Lake Elsinore Boat and Ski Club, veterans' organizations and Scout groups will participate.

The ribbon cutting ceremony will follow Mr. Fisher's address.

Boat races, limited to two races of no longer than five minutes each, will follow, succeeded by the Lake Elsinore Boat and Ski Club's water parade of boats decorated to depict the history of the lake. Then will come the water ski events.

By noon the lake will be opened to public use and from then on all special events, boats without mufflers and racing will be prohibited. The lake will be zoned for high speed boats (the lake center), up to 35 miles per hour (inland from center), and five miles per hour around the shoreline.

Boats will be able to launch only from two ramps which can each handle 15 boats simultaneously, one in the State Park and the other immediately to the west. Both ramps are operated by a concessioner, with similar fees. The lake use fee is \$3 and parking and launching is \$2. Special parking rates for boats berthed at the park, berthing rates, fuel rates, etc., are available from the concessioner.

The lake use fee is to provide for repayment of the \$750,000 from the Division of Small Craft Harbors which enabled purchase of the water, and to provide a fund to replenish the lake's seepage and evaporation losses. A Jew of the Men to Thank for Water in Lake Elsinore

One of Southern California's Favorite Resort Areas

The restoration of Lake Elsinore to its former status as one of Southern California's favorite resort areas ends a 15-year battle against seemingly insurmountable problems faced by local interests and water sports enthusiasts.

It's axiomatic that you can't float a boat on dry land, which in recent times is what most of the lake bed has been for more years than not. Now, with water in the lake once more, boaters, water skiers and swimmers are expected to head for Elsinore en masse as they did in "the good old days."

Dedicated as a State Park on May 5, 1962, the Lake Elsinore State Recreation Area includes the entire lake bed and several adjoining sections of upland property, some 2,954 acres in all. There are still number of private land owners around the lake.

Rancho La Laguna, as it was known when it was Mexican territory, was granted in 1844 to Senor Julian Manriquez by the territorial governor, Mancel Micheltorena. The first house in Riverside County was built in Rancho La Laguna in 1824. In the 60 years or so afterward, through changing ownerships, the lake bottom was called "The Meadows," prowiding lush feed for cattle and sheep. During that pemod the land was divided into small ranches and a townsite, named after Elsinore Castle in one of Shakespeare's writings, was established.

Since the original land grant of 13,300 acres, the

Lake Elsinore area has undergone more than 20 changes of ownership, including individuals, families and corporations. A railroad from San Diego to San Bernardino via Elsinore gave impetus to the lake's development as a resort.

During the period when the South Riverside Land & Water Company owned it, near disaster threatened on two fronts. The firm diverted lake water through a ditch to irrigate citrus groves 30 miles distant and thereby nearly killed the trees at Corona because the water was so highly mineralized. The diversion so lowered the lake level that recreational use was severely limited.

After the Lake Elsinore Development Corporation acquired the land in 1947 controversy developed over free use of the lake. Private land owners looked upon the lake as their property, contending that they had paid taxes on it. The State declared that the lake, as a navigable body of water, belonged in the public domain.

The issue was never really resolved until November 20, 1957, when the lake bed was gift deeded to the State along with some upland properties for use as a State Park.

There had been numerous years in the past when the lake bed was dry or nearly so, and a few times when exceptionally heavy rains had caused Elsinore

to overflow, spilling down Temescal Canvon into the Santa Ana River at Corona. Because of the present long dry cycle in Southern California, Lake Elsinore has been empty since 1950 except for an 18 month period in 1958-59. Now the State Division of Small Craft Harbors has provided a \$750,000 loan to the Division of Beaches and Parks with which to purchase water from the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California for refilling the lake and for facilities pertinent to the moving of water.

The refilling comes in the wake of a report that such a loan could be paid off through special fees from lake users, provided that enough water could be supplied over a period of years to replenish evaporation losses and that all boaters be required to pay the fees for the use of the lake.

A survey revealed that nine of every ten boaters expected to use the lake will come from Los Angeles Riverside, San Bernardino and Orange Counties. Peak weekend use will be limited in the interest of public safety.

With the water will come the recreation seekers by the thousands, and with them the economic revival of the Lake Elsinore area. Townspeople are confident. They're happy that there's more than one way of ending a drought!

A Review of Elsinore in the Revue

Ancient Indian tribes found sustenance and health in Elsinore Valley. They used the water of the mineral springs for healing purposes. It was the Indian who proved to the white man that mineral water was healing, for animals as well as man.

Proof of their having lived in the Valley can be seen at the Elsinore Historical Museum where grinding stones and other artifacts can be seen. In the hills of the Valley are the remains of Indian buriel grounds as well as caves stained by smoke.

FIRST WHITE SETTLER Old records indicate that Leandro Serrano was the first white settler in this part of the country. He had been supervising the mission interest located at Pala and in 1818-1819 Serrano moved his own cattle and sheep into the Valley with the help of the Indians. FIRST OWNER OF

RANCHO LA LAGUNA

Julian Manriquez was granted Rancho La Laguna with its Laguna Grande (the lake) by Manuel Micheltorena the then Governor of the Department of the Californias. The grant contained 19.338.80 acres-more or less. This was after the Californias had been taken from the King of Spain. subsequent to the fall of Maximillian. Julian used the land for a cattle ranch. PROPERTY CHANGES HANDS

La Laguna continued to be a cattle and sheep ranch through several owners until the 1880's when an influx of Americans came to California. Well-known names like Abel Stearns finder of the gold in Placerita Canyon six years be-

fore the Sutter Mill find. Don Augustin Machado, who built his home on what is now Machado Street and it became the first stage stop for the area and Juan Machado, Augustin's only son by his first marriage, who received a portion of the grant from his father.

AMERICANS COME TO LA LAGUNA

In 1865 Augustin Machado died and his widow and twelve children of that marriage sold the ranch to Charles A. Sumner and family in 1873. But ten years later, the Sumners lost the land to the London and San Francisco Bank Limited and the now 12,832 acres became the property of Donald M. Graham, William Collier and Franklin H. Heald. The \$24,000 paid for the ranch in 1883 is believed to be the same amount paid by Sumner ten years earlier. 8

It was Saturday, the 14th, the first day the lake was publicly opened. The "Cathy Jo" was



What promoted this annual barbecue?

Once upon a time, about 17 years ago, the town of Murrieta was without fire protection and the people were duly concerned, in fact the subject was brought up at a Farm Bureau meeting and it was there, in 1947, that the idea and the actual forming of a fire department came to life. A tax district was voted in and this began the Murrieta Fire Department.

A volunteer crew, a fire truck and fire house came first. On the first crew was R a y m o n d Thompson as chief; Vic Garrison, assistant chief; Oscar Matteson, secretary - treasurer and firemen were Coy Burnett, Charles Potter, Rev. W. G. Smith, Lawrence Dunham, Vern Huff, Floyd Rail and Sidney Ely.

Every fire department needs fire commissioners and serving on the first board were the late Hugo Guenther, Ernie Harbor and Walter Cooper. This group with the all-out cooperation and donations from the community, purchased a fire truck and built the firehouse, which was completed in the spring of 1948.

Naturally a celebration was in order for the dedication of the new fire house. The town was growing, it had fire protection now. This brought about the first barbecue and it was such a success that the or-

She holds a degree in Library Science and took her practice training in library work under the supervision of the South Dakota Free Library Association.

For six years, Mrs. Flyte served as librarian of the Buffalo County Library, one of four such libraries in the State, which served the whole county. She had general supervision of high school libraries on many of her teaching assignments.

Always aware of the great need for books in rural areas, Mrs. Flyte spoke of a favorite project she initiated when she was serving as State President of the South Dakota Congress of Parents and Teachers while living at Mitchell, South Dakota. This was known as the Bookmobile Project in which the State PTA furnished the money to build a bookmobile, the Works Projects Admini-

stration did the building, and the South Dakota Free Library furnished the books and the supervision. The bookmobile was then sent to the most rural counties of this great plains state, Bison and Harding Counties. Teachers and students would be on the road waiting to flag down the bookmobile as it made its initial trip. A young college student drove the bookmobile while Mrs. Flyte went on the first trip to make the necessary contacts for suitable book stations.

Mrs. Flyte began teaching at ENMS in 1955 and has always kept a watchful eye on the library in connection with her teaching the English classes. In 1961 she began serving as full-time librarian. In 1962 a larger room was made into an attractive library which also serves as a meeting place for the International Club, music rehearsals, and classes too small to work into the regular schedule. From 7 to 8 twice a week, an adult student, Mrs. Maria Roberts, comes to learn American history and government so she may become a citizen.



FROM DROUGHT TO RAIN

At that time there had been a serious long drought and the Valley was dotted with bleached bones of starved animals. In 1884 the rains producing a flood condition were most welcome. Five feet of rain fell and for the next fifty years Elsinore was a "Lake", and in 1886 California was a boom land, but in 1888 it was hurt by the collapse and Elsinore lost twothirds of its population. It was that year it was incorporated and by 1889 once more started to grow.

MINING IN THE AREA

In 1883 Madison Chaney and his wife discovered a coal vien in Alberhill and opened up the mine. At this time the Los Angeles Pressed Brick Company had a plant in operation near the same site.


