Letters Home Memorial Honors All Military Vets

At the Temecula Duck Pond is the location of the "Letters Home" Veterans Memorial. This monument was dedicated November 11, 2004 to honor all of our military service veterans regardless of whether they were wounded, or paid the ultimate sacrifice for freedom. Many men and women have served their country honorably during times of peace and war conflicts, and this Memorial

designed by artist Christopher Pardell was designed to recognize average Americans and honor them for their service. An inscription on the front of the memorial states:

"This Memorial Is For The Men & Women Who Had The Courage To Stand Up For Their Beliefs Answering The Call Of Their Nation And Risking Their Lives To Protect Freedom The People Of Temecula Honor Their Deeds"

As a major feature of this memorial, 16 different "Letters Home" from different eras of America's history have been reproduced. Letters ranging from 1779 during the Revolutionary War, through the 2003 Iraq conflict are available to read and many visitors have commented that they "... bring tears to your eyes" or "... tear your heart out".

I attended the dedication event along with my brother, who I had specially invited to come down from his home in Tumwater, WA. As a surprise for brother Don, I had purchased two of the special "pavers" that were part of the original project, and have since been added to as part of a path of honor. The two pavers I purchased (#96 & #100) were for brother to recognize his service during the Korean War and his having been awarded the Purple Heart, but also for our father Edwin to acknowledge his 30 years of service in the Navy as a corpsman and having been part of the Marine Embassy Guard Unit in Peking



China on December 7, 1941 when WWII began with the surprise bombing of Pearl Harbor. Dad ended up being a POW for the entire length of the war. Needless to say brother was surprised and deeply touched to tears.

So this year on Veterans Day don't forget to honor and remember all of those in your family and circle of friends who served in the military. A strong and active military is the best defense of our freedoms. Perhaps a visit to the Duck Pond would be in order.



Sunday, January 6th, Lynn Cudé will be portraying Ramona Wolf, the wife of Louis Wolf, who owned the Wolf Store Adobe. That building is still standing today at the Vail Ranch Headquarters. Come to hear the fascinating story of Ramona's life here in the late 1800s.

Sunday, February 3rd, Elaine Eshom will present Freda Knott who was a well-known Teacher, Librarian and School Board Trustee. This 15-minute presentation will be followed by Mindy Johnson, recounting the life of Maria Apis, a Luiseno Indian woman who inherited the Little Temecula Rancho.
